Q&A: Danny Russel

Young 'Riley' to visit festival

Actor will perform for Oct. 4 breakfast in annual tribute to poet

A tradition will continue Oct. 2-5 as the city of Greenfield once again hosts the Riley Festival.

Several things have changed. The former Mayor's Breakfast, for example, has been renamed the James Whitcomb Riley Breakfast — partly because Mayor Brad DeReamer will be in Japan the weekend of the

While overseas, the mayor will join in celebrating the 50th anniversary of Greenfield's sister city, Kaku-da, and participate in several other activities aimed at economic partnerships between Greenfield and Japa-

Many things, however, remain the same for the fes-tival, which is one of the largest fall festivals in Indiana. The focal point, as always, is Greenfield's most

well-known native son.

The "Hoosier Poet," James Whitcomb Riley, was born Oct. 7, 1849. The festival each year is held on the weekend closest to Riley's birthday.

At the Saturday breakfast, hometown hero Josh

Bleill – a U.S. Marine wounded in Iraq – will speak.
In addition, actor Danny Russel will perform his
popular portrayal of Riley.
Unlike many impersonators, who depict Riley in his
older years, Russel performs as the poet in his
younger days, when he was traveling the countryside

painting signs and performing at medicine shows.

The breakfast will be at 7:30 a.m. Oct. 4 at Park
Chapel Christian Church, 1176 E, McKenzie Road.

By e-mail, Russel recently answered questions

about his popular Riley act, which he performs Tues-days through Fridays each week at the Indiana State

Question: What got you interested in James Whitcomb Riley?

Answer: In 1997, I was merely another typical un-employed actor who was thrilled to be cast in an original play, commissioned by The Children's Mu-seum of Indianapolis, celebrating the life of our leg-endary Hoosier Poet. We played to thousands of students for three months and, due to overwhelming response, revived our production in 1998, 1999 (coinciding with Riley's 150th birthday) and 2002. After that, I developed a one-man vehicle and traveled the

Q: What's the most memorable experience

you've ever had while performing Riley?

A: My most gratifying and memorable experience? In 2006, I began appearing at the Indiana State Museum. During the month of May, many of our patrons were international visitors in town for the Indy 500. I was astonished that, not only was a particular family from Ireland cognizant of Riley and his work, they requested poem after poem (I've memorized 40 of his 1,044 published pieces) and left me a \$200 tip! There's simply no finer example of Riley's universal

Q: Have you ever been to the Riley Festival before or visited his boyhood home in Greenfield?

A: Over the years, I've visited the Riley Festival in Greenfield several times, although ironically, it's the first time I'll be performing there. I've portrayed Riley

virtually everywhere in Indiana - except his hometown!

Q: How often do you typically portray Riley in the course of a year?

A: I currently perform 250 to 275 shows each year at schools, libraries, churches, nursing homes, private parties, festivals, etc. Youngsters scream with laughter as they're introduced to him, and the older folks smile in recognition and can often recite right along with me since they grew up with his poetry. These days, I'm extremely blessed to enjoy such a wonderful career honoring Riley's legacy and keeping alive his

Q: What is your favorite Riley poem?

A: My favorite poem is undoubtedly "Little Orphant Annie" (1892), which is also his most popular and widely recognized work. Even if people have never heard of James Whitcomb Riley, they all seem to know "the gobble-uns'll get ye ef you don't watch

Q: The 7:30 a.m. breakfast is pretty early for many people. Are there any other opportunities for Eastside and Hancock County residents to see your performance?

A: If you can't make it to the breakfast, you can still catch me Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Indiana State Museum, 650 W. Washington St., Indianapolis. I'm easy to find - as you can tell by my authentic 1890s suit!
