The story of Daniel Boone is the story of America—its ideals, its promise, its romance, and its destiny.

Danny Russel's dynamic portrait uncovers the complex character of a man whose astonishing life was far stranger and more fascinating than the myths surrounding him. He initially spent months researching and compiling the show during visits to Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana and Missouri—traveling more than a thousand miles to learn where and how Boone lived, hunted, fought, and dreamed of the next frontier.

In 1784, John Filson published a chronicle detailing Boone's remarkable achievements and his crucial role in Westward Expansion. The book made him instantly famous, and in this compelling portrayal, we find Daniel reliving adventurous years rife with hardship and danger — losing two sons

and a brother in his attempts to settle "the dark and bloody ground" of Kentucky, discovering what is now known as Squire Boone Caverns in southern Indiana, rescuing his kidnapped daughter, as well as defeating a Shawnee siege through pure courage and cunning.

Depicted as a natural leader whose exploits amply justify his larger-than-life reputation, our hero survived years of ambushes, captures and desperate defenses, leaving behind lands he had discovered, protected, settled and improved.

In fact, Boone would be a significant figure even if he hadn't fought alongside George Washington in the French and Indian War, or led Abraham Lincoln's grandfather into Kentucky, or cut the Wilderness Road through the Cumberland Gap, or served in Virginia's General Assembly with Thomas Jefferson, or

inspired James Fenimore
Cooper to write *The Last of the Mohicans*, or had his
portrait painted by John James
Audubon, or been
immortalized by Lord Byron in
the epic poem "Don Juan."

Of himself, Boone said this:
"Many heroic exploits and chivalrous adventures are related to me which exist only in the regions of fancy. With me the world has taken great

liberties, and yet I have been but a common man." Yet no mere commoner represents the American spirit — its lust for exploration and independence, its dreamy idealism, its rugged and stubborn individualism, its unwavering sense of purpose — better than the legendary Daniel Boone.

In addition to his illustrious acting career and numerous tours, Mr. Russel is a six-time grant recipient honored by the Indiana Arts Commission.
