JAMES WHITCOMB RILEY: THE HOOSIER POET



poet in America?

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Mark Twain called his friend James Whitcomb Riley "the funniest man in America!" With his depictions of Hoosiers as a kindly and wholesome people, Riley's vast output made him nationally famous — the best-selling poet of the 19th century.

Danny Russel will bring this whimsical portrayal to your venue as he captures our Hoosier Poet's playfulness and sense of mischief. He initially spent months researching and compiling the show during visits to Riley's boyhood home in Greenfield (built by his father Reuben during the 1850s), his adult residence in Indianapolis at Lockerbie Square, and in Bloomington at the Lilly Library, which features the world's largest

collection of manuscripts and published information about the poet. Mr. Russel's years of

performing have given him a wealth of material to draw from, and if desired, he will also field questions after the program.

James Whitcomb Riley looks back at his difficult childhood, his work as an

itinerant sign painter, his time as a musician and actor with traveling medicine shows, his newspaper stints, overwhelming popularity on the lecture circuit and unprecedented book sales. In a sentimental, humorous and completely captivating manner, he also recites and performs "Little Orphant Annie," "The Raggedy Man," "When the Frost is on the Punkin" and many other favorites.

Mr. Russel has carefully constructed the show to include every major aspect of our Hoosier Poet's life and career, along with many arcane and surprising facts. The experience he delivers proves to be exciting for the Riley aficionado and novice alike.

Riley's dialect poetry inspired the creation of Raggedy Ann, and with his gift to the Indianapolis/Marion County Public Library, he revealed how important it was that future

generations have free access to books. The Riley Memorial Association, Riley Hospital, and Camp Riley for Youth all still operate in his name, making the poet's legacy unique because of what he symbolizes for the children of his home state.
